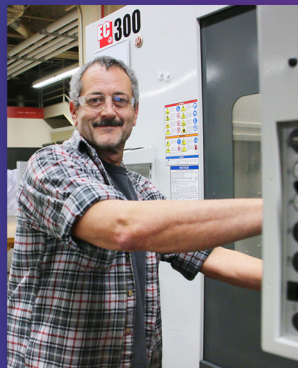
Apply to a local community or technical college to gain skills in programs such as machining, industrial maintenance (mechatronics) and welding.
